The Excellence in Volunteerism Awards, started in 2019, is a U.S. Corning employee program administered by the Corning Incorporated Foundation. The program recognizes Corning employees who help make Corning communities vibrant by volunteering their free time at non-profit organizations. The Excellence in Volunteerism Award allows employees to nominate other employees showing exceptional volunteer commitment in the community. The selected employees are able to designate a \$1,000 grant to an eligible non-profit organization of their choice.

Kevin Adriance, Gorilla Glass, Corning, NY

Kevin Adriance shows his commitment to youth through the sport of baseball as a coach with Corning Painted Post Little League. Kevin works with youth to teach them the sport of baseball on the field and in the dugout. In the dugout, he organizes players into their positions, gets the batting line up set, and motivates the team.
